We usually meet up in my office where we can get to know each other and where I can answer their questions about this wonderful congregation. I love getting to know new people and getting their perspectives and questions about First & Calvary.


When folks are contemplating making First & Calvary their church home, they'll often reach out to find out about church membership – or "covenant partnership," as we call it in the ECO denomination. This year alone, we've welcomed 25 new Covenant Partners! We've welcomed them all in worship, but I wanted you to see all their smiling faces here in the Review at the end of the year.



MSUI BAND LUNCHION BACK AFTER TWO YEARS

For many years prior to the Covid pandemic, First & Calvary Church provided lunch to the Missouri State University Marching Band the week before the beginning of the fall semester. With classes not yet started, and the MSU cafeterias not yet open, the staff of the marching band had come to rely on First & Calvary to help feed their 300-plus group one day during the five-day band camp.

In 2020 and 2021, the program was temporarily discontinued, but with the removal of the Covid mandates, Missouri State University reached out to Reverend Don Everts to ask if F & C would be inter-



ested in reviving the program. The response from Don, our Campus Committee, and Minister of Outreach Wendy Everts was an emphatic "yes."

So, on August 16th, First & Calvary opened its doors to 350 students from the MSU Marching Band. Volunteers grilled hotdogs and hamburgers under

the portico. At the same time, two long rows of tables in the South atrium were loaded with food to appeal to every dietary need of the students, from vegan and vegetarian offerings to peanut-free options and more than 30 dozen homemade cookies for dessert.

The young guests and staff of the MSU marching band loaded their plates and gathered in the North atrium to dine, where Rev. Everts welcomed the group by telling them that he, too is an MSU Bear (Don is in a graduate certificate program) before blessing the meal. The event was seamless in its execution due to the hard work and planning on the part of volunteers and staff. Not only were all 350 students fed, but seconds were offered and enthusiastically accepted. The genuine appreciation and courtesy of the band members were mentioned by many who volunteered for the event.

Several weeks after the event, Reverend Don Everts and Wendy Everts, Minister of Outreach, received a thank-you note from the organization to our congregation, and all the student musicians signed more than a dozen thank-you posters. You can find the posters and notes framed and exhibited on the main floor hallway overlooking the North atrium.



FIRST & CALVARY INTRO ITS FIRST ALPHA COURS

In addition, several church scholars led a theater program for the children in childcare which was warmly received. Attendance was robust, with ten full tables of eight, including a full youth table.

It was a significant time for those attending, with many wonderful conversations around the table. We had seven individuals attend who were not from First & Calvary Church, who so enjoyed the experience that they invited four others to join. In addition, one of the children in attendance enjoyed the theater program so much that they asked two others to come to experience the program.

Wendy Everts stated, "It's a wonderful thing to be a part of the body of Christ working together, believing God still transforms lives."

The following is Hayden "Riley" Jarvis' experience and witness to the Alpha course.

"To preface, at the time, I had only been going to First and Calvary for about three months after just moving to Springfield for my first job as an Architect. I only started attending a church three years before at Kansas State University. So I had no previous Christian education or regular church attendance, two years hampered by COVID-19 restrictions/regulations.

As a result, I had a multitude of questions with no fo-



rum to ask them, just for example, "Who/What is the Holy Spirit?", "Can the sins accrued during the 24 years of my life be really forgiven?" and most importantly, "How/where do I start reading the Bible?" which I had never read independently before going to Alpha.

For so long, I had always been alone trying to figure these things out and get-

ting the motivation to read the Bible, so having a place where I could meet new people and talk with them about these things once every week in this new city was something my soul needed. After five weeks, I felt comfortable enough to start reading a chapter daily, and I have been doing so ever since.

After beginning to read, I realized what I had been missing out on as the word of God started to parallel with what I was experiencing or worrying about at that moment (which gave me comfort and peace that I had never experienced before). After going to Alpha, I also know more about the congregation. They know more about me, so gone (for the most part) is the "Are you a Missouri State Student?" question that had kept me in a causality loop of repeated conversations...

At such a pivotal time in my life, I am glad I took the step, for my spiritual life would have continued to stagnate, as I now feel confident that I truly can begin to learn the word of God and have the community and openness to discuss it with others."

RABU! FALL YOUTH RETREAT REMINISCING

This October, Pastor Don and I filled my minivan with sleeping bags, gear, and youth and made the 3.5-hour drive to Waterloo, IL, to gather with youth from a sister ECO church for a Fall Retreat. I was grateful for some uninterrupted time with this sweet bunch of students and expected it would be a great weekend. But I did not anticipate how deeply the Spirit would move among us as we grew closer to each other and the Lord.

The speakers for our retreat were our very own Pastor Don and Madeleine Bauer. When I started here, Pastor Don shared with me a vision the Lord had given him to equip young preaching apprentices. That vision resonates with me because we need the younger generation to reach their peers with the gospel. Within weeks, I saw this vision in action as Madeleine quickly responded that she had been feeling the Spirit's lead to grow as a preacher and minister to her peers. So, Pastor Don, Madeleine, and I began meeting weekly for an hour for preaching mentoring, with our time soon focused on preparing for speaking at the retreat. Through prayer, Bible study, and brainstorming together, four talks emerged on the theme Rooted, based on Colossians 2:6-7:



"So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflow-

ing with thankfulness."

After all the preparation, seeing those talks unfold at the retreat was deeply encouraging. Madeleine passionately preached to her peers alongside Pastor Don. And the Spirit used their preaching to work within the hearts of the youth at the retreat. On the first night, we gave the students temporary tattoo markers and taught them a Bible memorization system that Madeleine frequently uses. The youth wrote the first letter of each word of the Colossians memory verse for the weekend on their forearm and quickly began putting God's word in their hearts. The "rooted and built up" part of the verse forms the acronym RABU! So that became our quick chant and encouragement for one another over the weekend! This is a system I'm personally inspired by, and I know many of us will use this tool again.

The retreat was equally parts spiritually deep and FUN! The students were divided into two teams, The Delightful Dragons and the Killer Princesses. They competed fiercely, including a challenge to protect a rubber duck with a bin full of duct tape, paper towels, rubber bands, and other supplies to make it as difficult as possible for the other team to get to their duck. The silliness added to the bonding we formed with each other and the students from our sister church. We closed the retreat by having the students from each church prayed for by the students from the other church. By the end of the weekend, we were joyfully exhausted from deep conversations, crazy camp games, and devotional time with the Lord. God is on the move among our youth at First and Calvary and beyond!

MOPS 2022

2022 saw the introduction of the MOPS – Mothers of Preschoolers - program at First & Calvary Presbyterian Church. Wendy Everts, Minister of Outreach, began the program to meet the needs of women in our community, offering training, entertainment, and rejuvenation time for moms by providing childcare and general support in a non-judgmental atmosphere for moms regardless of religious affiliation.

First & Calvary debuted the program in the fall by sponsoring a nursing and changing booth at the annual Springfield Cider Days.

What began as a play date for preschoolers developed into an evening and weekly morning program. As of December 2022, ten moms attend, with six from outside First & Calvary. We are encouraged by the impact the moms reported in their lives.

By providing superior childcare, women with preschool children can meet other mothers of young children in an unhurried atmosphere, participate in crafts, and enjoy lectures on time management, stress relief, and a variety of different subjects specific to the needs of mothers of preschool children.

Previous MOPS mom Brenda Bauer explains the value that the program provided to her when her daughters were small. "We were encouraged to leave our image of Christian Perfection at the door. Instead, MOPS is a place to have support in our honest, messy lives."

This year, Buttons Bowers led the group in a door-hanging craft for fall, and Jen Reed, one of the MOPS mentors and leaders, spoke on stress and techniques for relieving stress. In addition, Faith White led the group in a devotion on the meaning of balm and a craft making bath balms.

Jen Reed and Ann Schaller served as mentors for these young moms by attending the MOPS group, listening to the interests and concerns of the participants, and by checking in on the young women when they couldn't attend.

Wendy hopes that in 2023 the program will continue to grow to meet the needs of young mothers in the community.

We are a loving church family of all generations that's been worshipping in the heart of Springfield since 1844.


Our mission is to labor alongside our Father as he draws people to Jesus & grows them as disciples.
