I suppose I must have read Isaiah 2 (and Isaiah 56) previously. I must have read this clear description of what would happen in the age of the Messiah: the Mountain of the Lord being lifted up above all other mountains, people streaming up to the mountain to be with God and learn from him and begin to walk in his ways.

I must have previously read the beautiful words about people dwelling with God, in the House of the Lord, and the memorable words about God's house being a House of Prayer for every nation.

But none of that had ever stuck in my head. None of these images had ever fired up my imagination, until that one day that I turned to Isaiah 2 and the words leapt off the page. I remember thinking: Has this always been in my Bible? How have I missed this?!

Since then, this image (and its implications) has floated around in my imagination. I am motivated to see people stream into glad fellowship with God. I'm willing to sacrifice to welcome people into the House of the Lord. And I long for the day when all God's people will come home once and for all in the new creation.

So, imagine my excitement when I saw Jesus' reference to Isaiah 2's image right there in our main stained glass. And imagine my smile when my visits to our History Room revealed to me that for about 30 years First & Calvary had "The House of Prayer" at the top of every worship bulletin!

In this quarter's edition of The Review, I invite you to read story after story of what it looks like for us to pursue this vision of being "a house of prayer for every generation." May God make all of us more joyful in his house of prayer!

She asked for prayer for their situation. Then, another volunteer who met her heard her story the day of the Eggstravaganza and directed her to talk to me since I have been a military spouse. What a joy it was to meet her then and tell her I'd been praying for her and offer her support.

COUNCIL of CHURCHES

On July 10th, First & Calvary Church participated in All Church Volunteer Day at the Council of Churches. In preparation for that day of service the congregation donated more than 4000 diapers destined for the Council's Diaper Bank of the Ozarks. By the day of the event, additional donations from F&C put that total over 5000 individual diapers donated.

The Diaper Bank was established in 2012 and distributes diapers – disposable and cloth – through partner agencies and to families in need throughout the Ozarks. Since 2012 the Diaper Drive has distributed 6,523,816 diapers!



The afternoon began with a presentation of the success of the F&C diaper drive and the grateful acknowledgement of that success by the Council.

The coordinator for the Council of Churches Diaper Campaign, Tranna Shaughnessy, explained that 1/3 of all babies in the Ozarks don't have enough diapers, which leads to UT infections and other health issues, and that prior to the F&C diaper drive donation the diaper bank was running low because of an increased need for them this year.



She was brought to tears when Rev. Don Everts presented the Council with a check on behalf of the Mission Committee to purchase an additional 30,000 diapers because she realized she was going to have enough diapers to meet the current need.

Following the presentation, the volunteers were provided with a tour of the new facility on Division Street that included a look at the New Unused Clothing room for adults and children that offers clients of the Council a unique opportunity to select their own new, unused apparel. The Council believes that this unique opportunity simulates one of life's enjoyable experiences and signals the respect with which the Council views all clients.

Teams were created to count and package 10 diapers into a bundle, packaging a total of 12,000 diapers...

The tour concluded with a visit to the Break Room donated by First & Calvary Church where directions were given for the day's volunteer activities.

This year's participants heard the gospel and were showered with love and surprises. Many reported that they couldn't wait to invite their friends next year.



BAPTISM

As Christians we celebrate baptism as a communal act of public worship, and it is one of the most joyous occasions that we at First & Calvary Presbyterian Church have the honor to witness.

Baptism is an important part of making disciples of Jesus. In Matthew 28, Jesus said: "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the father, and the son, and the Holy Spirit; teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." According to Jesus, then, baptism is an important part of making disciples.

In the baptism of infants, we live out our confidence that disciples are made because God takes the initiative. It was Jesus who said, "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him." (John 6:44) And so even helpless infants can be claimed as members of the covenant community. In the baptism of adults, we live out our confidence that disciples are made as we respond to God's initiative with a confession of faith. Again, it was Jesus who said, "Come to me all who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

We baptized with water, not because water saves, but because water points to a deeper reality: that in God's grace we are washed clean of all our sins. This is part of what makes witnessing a baptism so moving and powerful for us as a congregation.

This year, First & Calvary Presbyterian Church witnessed the baptisms of Carl Heck IV, Benjamin Hensen, Walker Rathe, and Charlotte Swope. GENERATIONAL LEARNING



"CHILDREN SEE CONNECTIONS TO CHRIST AND THE GOSPEL AND HOW IT APPLIES TO THEIR LIVES"



Ages three years to 5th grade have been learning from the New Testament from their incredible team of teachers. Our elementary-aged children have finished a three-year cycle of lessons from the Gospel Project Curriculum that started in Genesis and finished in Revelation.

Throughout this chronological journey through God's word, children see connections to Christ and the gospel and how it applies to their lives.

During Lent, families were given special Pretzel Prayer devotional kits.

After Easter, preschool and elementary children have been learning about the fruit of the Spirit and historical faith "superheroes" as part of our Agape League Musical program. Examples of these heroes include Harriet Tubman, William Tyndall, and Amy Carmichael.

Our middle school and high school youth finished a 12-week inductive and reformed Bible study for teens called "The Christian Mind". Then they began a similar inductive study on Philippians. Finally, we invited youth to participate in the churchwide Lenten study on prayer. Several students from the Youth class attended the Sunday night Lenten experience, leading in worship and bringing friends.

Each Sunday we would learn about different types of prayer and then pray in those new ways. During one of those evening sessions, God met Shari Gerke in a powerful way. Here's her story:




"For nearly four decades, I have asked God to heal my sister, only to be met with silence. As years passed without healing, my prayers changed to 'If not healing, please ease her physical pain and suffering.' Still, there was no healing, only the progression of her Multiple Sclerosis. God has clearly answered my prayers before, but there was silence in this most important one.

I have asked why I continue receiving His blessings while only suffering increases for her. I have felt guilt over what He has given me and withheld her. Health, children, grandchildren, travel, everything. My home is my sanctuary, hers a prison.

During the Lenten Sunday night prayer experience, we did an exercise in Intercessory Prayer. I heard God clearly ask, "Do you trust me?" I have trusted Him, knowing this illness is for this life only, and there is a great blessing ahead for her. But it is a long life trapped in a body filled with unrelenting pain. However, hearing that question directed toward me changed everything for me personally.

I still don't understand why some people must suffer while others don't, but hearing those words from God so clearly lifted a burden God did not intend me to carry. Sunday nights certainly were a blessing to so many, and I thank God that I walk out of the Lenten season lifted and lighter; praise be to God."

As Foster explains in his book, prayer has a way of changing the one praying as much as it does the one being prayed for. This shouldn't be too surprising. "On a Sunday evening during Lent, Cathy and I decided to leave home a few minutes early and visit the "Garden of Gethsemane Walk." On our way, we ran into Charlotte and Jason Swope and invited them to join us. What a treat to visit it with younger friends.

Everything in the Garden reminds you and draws you into a quiet conversation with God. The plants, soft lighting, and stained glass help you focus on the love of God and His reaching out to us during the Easter season.

Chairs were set up around the room to allow time for relaxing and quiet reflection.

As we walked into the room, we visited the various stations independently. The setting was quiet and contemplative. After we had visited the stations, rather than leaving, we each sat down and listened to the quiet. It was easy to close our eyes and pray, relax, reflect on the room's beauty, and understand the depth of God's love. Then, after about 15 minutes, we each got up and walked out.

If you have the opportunity to visit the Garden of Gethsemane Walk next year, please do so. Regardless of age, there is something for everyone.

And on your way out, pick up one of the olive wood beads from Bethlehem. It's a wonderful reminder of the Garden experience and God's love for each of us.
